Women's Aviation trip.

For the women's aviation trip on the 1st of March, around 30 students were invited to go to City Aviation House near London City Airport to talk about women in STEM and encourage young girls to take up male-dominated jobs. This occurred for a full school day, and it involved taking a tour around city airport and understanding how its features has helped its development in the business and economic sector. Students also took a tour outside the airport and witnessed two airplanes take flight in what could be called the worlds' narrowest port!

This inspired our young girls to take up STEM orientated jobs and motivated them, by seeing real life examples of women that hold significant careers in the aviation and STEM sectors. This not only prompted understanding about the role of women in many fields, most specifically the male-dominated sector, but it also taught Greatfields' pupils about the types of STEM careers that will be opened further into the future and the types of roles available in certain jobs.

Firstly, all the students at the trip had the opportunity to meet two women working in aviation, one whose job specialised in customer service and the other being the Manager of the control's room at City Airport. They explained in detail what their jobs looked like on a daily-basis. Students were able to understand and comprehend the types of qualifications and measures required in STEM jobs and, through this, the large scale of opportunities for aviation-based careers became evident.

In the aviation trip at the end of the session, students learnt about the importance of sustainability and the use of renewable sources in an airport. This was explained to find ways in which the amount of fossil fuels and greenhouse gases emitted in an airport via planes and transport affects and speeds up the role of the enhanced greenhouse effect and climate change. Students were given the task to work in teams of up to six pupils, where they had to work at a STEM orientated business challenge. This would then allow them to pitch their ideas on the economic sustainability of an airport to a judging panel and an audience in May. If students go through, they will be competing against the best students chosen and be taken to a yacht for their ultimate pitch. Students from Greatfields who win, will receive prizes such as vouchers, certificates and much more!

The trip was an exciting and euphoric experience where students have been greatly inspired and encouraged about the many opportunities that are available to them later in their futures. The trip made everyone feel included and appreciated as their ideas were keenly listened to and it felt as the whole group had become one team under one goal: to support women stand up and take a career that they aspire for.

- Affordable and clean energy






Ukraine 2022:

Ramadan Mubarack:

Every year, Muslims around the world anticipate the sighting of the new crescent moon that signifies the official first day of Ramadan, the ninth month of the Islamic calendar and the most sacred month in Islamic culture.

The start of Ramadan each year changes because the Islamic calendar follows the lunar calendar and follow the phases of the moon. The beginning and end of Ramadan are determined by a moon sighting committee in Saudi Arabia.

Throughout the month, fasting between sunrise and sunset is obligatory for all Muslims, except for the ill, pregnant, traveling, elderly or mensurating women. Days missed fasting can be made up throughout the rest of the year, either all at once or one day here and there.

Meals are opportunities for Muslims to gather with others in the community and break their fast together. Pre-dawn breakfast, or suhoor, before the first prayer of the day, Fajr, marks the beginning of the fast. The evening meal, iftar, can begin once the sunset prayer, Maghrib, is finished. Since the Prophet Mohammad broke his fast with dates and a glass of water, Muslims eat dates at both suhoor and iftar. Dates were one of the Prophet's favourite foods and have many health benefits.

In Islam, when someone is fasting, it is encouraged to not argue, swear, or to do anything with ill intent. While these traits are recommended to be practiced throughout the year, it is even more important during this sacred month. Muslims also believe that during this time the Devil (known as Shaytan in Islam) is locked up, and this makes Muslims often reconsider their actions and become more pious.

The naming of Ramadan stems from the Arabic root "ar-ramad," which means scorching heat. Muslims believe that in A.D. 610, the angel Gabriel appeared to Prophet Muhammad and revealed to him the Quran, the Islamic holy book. That revelation, Laylat Al Qadar—which translates to "Night of Power"—is believed to have occurred during Ramadan. Muslims fast during that month to commemorate the revelation of the Quran.

After the last day of Ramadan, Muslims celebrate its ending with Eid al-Fitr—the "festival of breaking the fast"—which begins with communal prayers at daybreak. During these three days of festivities, participants gather to pray, eat, exchange gifts, and pay their respects to deceased relatives. Some cities host carnivals and large prayer gatherings, too.

In our school, we have a wide variety of students from diverse backgrounds, Muslims being a huge majority of them, so let us celebrate Ramadan together and Ramadan Mubarak to all.

On the woman of importance in your duration








Entrevista: Ms formandez-

En México visité Chichén Itzá, un complejo de ruinas mayas ubicado en la península de Yucatán en México. Los tres más conocidos de estos complejos son la Gran Plataforma Norte, que incluye los monumentos de El Castillo, el Templo de los Guerreros y el Gran Juego de Pelota; El Grupo Osario, que incluye la pirámide de Osario, así como el Templo de Xtoloc; y el Grupo Central, que incluye el observatorio también llamado El Caracol, Las Monjas y Akab Dzib. Otros complejos incluyen el Grupo Casa Colorada, el Grupo Central y el antiguo Chichén. Chichén Itzá es también el hogar de





varios cenotes (pozos naturales de agua subterránea), incluyendo el Cenote Xtoloc o "Cenote Sagrado".

In Mexico I visited the Chichen Itza, a complex of Mayan ruins located on the Mexico's Yucatan Peninsula. The three best-known of these complexes are the Great North Platform, which includes

the monuments of El Castillo, the Temple of Warriors, and the Great Ball Court; The Osario Group, which includes the Osario pyramid as well as the Temple of Xtoloc; and the Central Group, which includes the observatory also called El Caracol, Las Monjas, and Akab Dzib. Other complexes include the Casa Colorada Group, the Central Group, and Old Chichen. Chichen Itza is also home to several cenotes (natural pits of groundwater), including the Xtoloc Cenote or "Sacred Cenote."



4) ¿Qué diferentes comidas tradicionales probó?

What different traditional foods did you try?

La Feria de Málaga comienza el 13 de agosto hasta el 20 de agosto y es una fiesta que se desarrolla en dos zonas; uno durante el día está en el centro de Málaga y la feria nocturna que tiene lugar en el Cortijo de Torres. Las calles del centro se decoran durante toda la duración de la feria. Hay música folclórica y baile abundan en las calles de la ciudad, así como música para todos los gustos donde predomina la música típica de Verdiales. Hay puestos de comida en la Feria de Noche y bares y restaurantes en la zona de Feria de Día.

The Malaga Fair begins the 13th of August until the 20th, and it is a festival that takes place in two areas; one during the day is in the downtown area of Malaga and the night fair which takes place at Cortijo de Torres. The downtown streets are decorated throughout the duration of the fair. There's folk music and dancing abound in the streets of the city, as well as music for all tastes where predominates the typical Verdiales music. There are food stands at the Night Feria and bars and restaurants at the Day Feria area.
