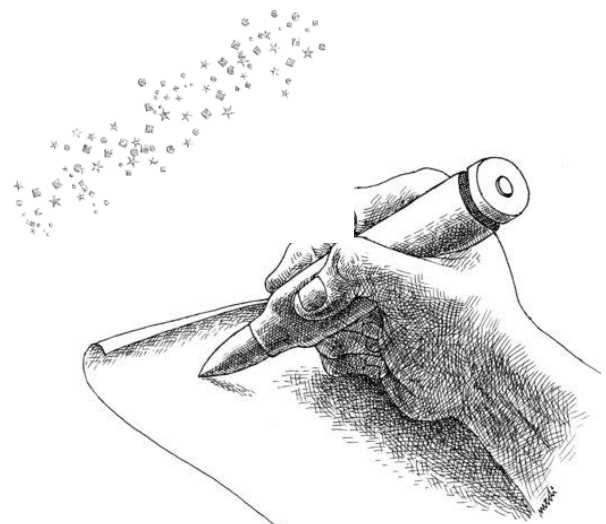
Hello, my name is Ula and I just joined newspaper club. I am in 7 Moore – one of the biggest forms in Year 7.

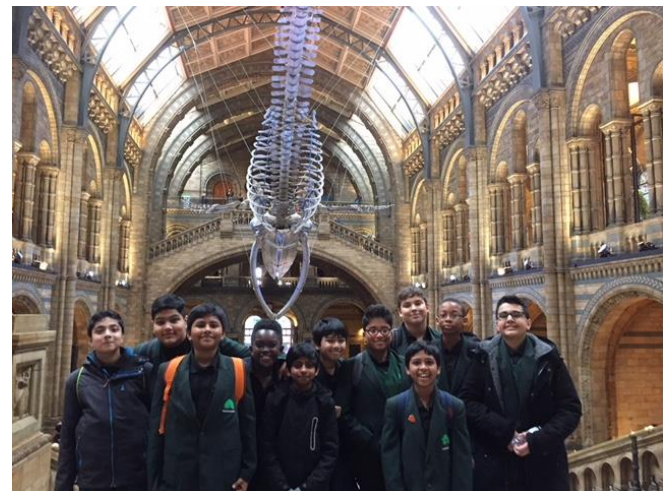

Greatfields School Opens the Doors of the New School Building!

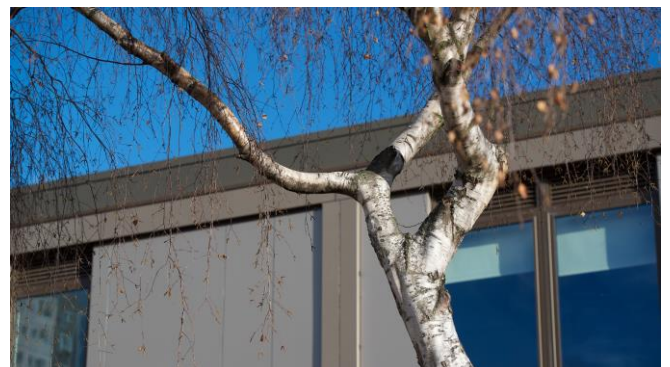
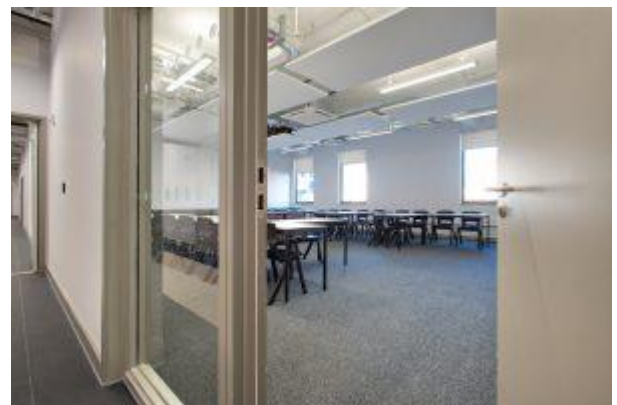


As many of you know, over the recent weeks both staff and students from the School Council have taken a trip to visit Greatfields new school building.

What do they do?

I would like to thank you – the students and parents of Greatfields School, for your important contributions in making our school a calm, polite and purposeful place in which to learn, and to Mr Paul and his staff for their outstanding professionalism and commitment to ensure that every young person at Greatfields School will achieve their very best. The view that Greatfields is a very good school indeed is not just the view of the governors, but also of all its many visitors.

And so who are the governors? Currently we are small group of people who willingly give our time freely to the school to work with Mr Paul to discuss and agree ways in which the school might be improved even further. We do this largely through meetings held on average once a term.

We meet as a single group known as the Local Governing Board, and also split into two smaller groups known as sub-committees, which support the work of the main Board. One of these sub-committees (known as Standards and Curriculum) looks the attainment and progress made by all students in the school by each subject area, and also at wider aspects such as the range of the out-of-school activities, or trips made by students.

The other sub-committee named Finance and Resources, is self-explanatory in that it monitors the way that money is spent at the school, ensuring that this represents best value for money.

There are currently 10 governors although this number will increase as the school grows.

Whilst we are a small group, governors have been appointed carefully to ensure we have the best possible range and mix of essential skills and expertise. Two governors work in businesses and have particular expertise in financial matters. Two more governors work in the Education sector, and understand the interest and motivations of young people in the Borough extremely well. We have two parent governors, a governor representing the staff at the school, and one of the Councillors from the Gascoigne ward. The two remaining governors worked in Children's Services for the council. We hope to appoint a governor from a university in the very near future.

You can also expect to see governors around the school regularly – some of you may have already have met a governor!

Cooking Club:

Recipes for Christmas!

Orange & ginger stained glass biscuits



Makes 14

Ingredients

sunflower oil, for greasing

175g plain flour, plus extra

1 tsp ground ginger

zest 1 orange

100g butter, cold, cut into chunks

50g golden caster sugar

1 tbsp milk

12 fruit-flavoured boiled sweets

icing sugar, to dust

Method

1. Heat the oven to 180C/ fan 160/ gas mark 4. Grease 2 large baking sheets with oil. Mix the flour, ginger, orange zest and butter with 1/2 teaspoon of salt to fine crumbs in a processor. Or you can mix with your fingers - mix the ingredients until they look like crumbs.
2. Mix in the sugar and milk, turn out the mix and knead on a floured surface until it is smooth. Wrap the mixture in cling film and chill in the fridge for 15 minutes.
3. Roll out the dough on a surface to the thickness of a £1 coin. Use the large heart cutters to cut out heart shapes. Then use small heart shape cutters to cut out the middles. Re-roll leftover pieces and cut out more heart biscuits. Place these carefully on the baking sheets.
4. Crush the sweets in their wrappers with a rolling pin, then put the pieces into the middle of the biscuits - the sweets should be level with the top of the dough.
5. Bake the biscuits for 15- 20 minutes or until the biscuits are golden brown and the middles have hardened.

These biscuits should keep for up to one month if kept in an air tight container.

Cheese stars



Makes 10

Ingredients

160g puff pastry sheet

mugful of grated cheddar cheese

Flour for dusting

1 tablespoon of milk

Dried oregano for topping

Method

1. Unroll the pastry sheet and sprinkle lots of the cheese over one half of the sheet. Now fold the pastry sheet in half to cover the cheese and seal it.
2. Dust your rolling pin and work surface with a little flour and lay your pastry sheet on it. Roll out the pastry sheet so it is double in size.
3. Heat the oven to 200C/180C fan/ gas mark 6 and line 2 baking sheets with baking parchment.
4. Use cookie star cutters, cut the pastry into shapes and put them on them on the baking sheets. Fold the left over trimmings over back on themselves and re-roll to cut more shapes.
5. Brush the shapes with a little milk, add a pinch of cheese and sprinkle on the oregano.
6. Bake pastry in the oven for 10 minutes or until golden and have risen.

These will keep for up to 3 days.
