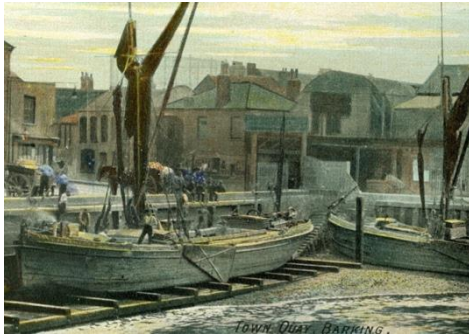

Barking has always had cultural significance but over the years, due to the forced urbanisation of our area, the pillars of importance that this borough holds are slowly fading behind the futuristic infrastructure and being buried under the newly paved roads. It is paramount that we cling onto the history.

Back in time



From the 14th century until the mid-19th century, the fishing industry was the number one generator of the borough's wealth with many of Abbey's residents describing fishing as their part time occupation. The fishery was such a large part of the economy so much so that when conservators of the Thames prosecuted Barking fishermen for the use of kiddle nets in 1406 many aggravated the offence by rioting.

Defoe even described Barking as 'a busy little port fishing for the London market.'

Barking is also where:

- William the Conqueror stayed during the construction of the Norman keep
- Where the explorer James Cook married in 1762
- Royal ships were repaired and fitted out during Henry VIII's reign

The evolvement of Barking

After many centuries, Barking began to evolve and grow opening its first community park in 1898. It was a symbol of pride for many Barking tenants as they labelled it as the 'best park in East London' containing an outdoor pool, children's play areas and pavilions. On a hot summer's day many flocked to the park-families, friends, and children all an amalgamation of a community.



However, Barking's metamorphosis does not end at the park; an exquisite library was also built filled to the brim with books a pandorica of fabulous interwoven randomness bursting at the seams with treasured literature. Believe it or not, but the borough even had a cinema lined with plush red carpets the aroma of sweet-smelling popcorn wafting through the air filled with an anticipating wide-eyed audience as they watched Ghostbusters capture monsters and Marty McFly travel back to the future with doc.

Barking Today

Now walk through the streets of Barking today and the library has been refurbished to hold more computers than books, the outdoor pool has been filled and the cinema has been



replaced with Nandos. And I know you may be thinking, places will always change and nothing ever stays the same but sometimes the fortunes of history are incomparable to the benefits of urbanisation. Don't get me wrong I appreciate the upkeep and attention Barking gets as we refuse to allow it to be forgotten and fade into its history. But we must remember that Barking's past holds more importance than any future.

The Dawn of Barking by Kaloyan Yalmov (10M)

For those lucky enough to have spent time in Barking, you will be aware if it's truly magnificent landmarks like... ASDA and LIDL. Okay, it may not seem so exciting but Barking definitely has an interesting past.

Its history goes well back to the 16th century, when development was centered in Barking Abbey. William the conqueror himself stayed present at Barking Abbey during the construction of the Norman keep. Up until the 19th century, it held great relevance in its fishing port, when marketing gardening became the main economic activity. Fishing in Barking dates back to the 14th century; embarking on significant attraction and attention of Barking's trade. The urbanisation led to remarkable creations, of which I believe a shame no longer exist. This includes a grand cinema, an outdoor pool and many more highlights.

In the early 1800s, the population of Barking was still very small: only 1585 in the town and 280 in Ripple Road. It rose steadily throughout the 19th century. Expansion of Barking increased with the upcoming population, which was heavily contributed by the town council. Housing continued rapidly along some of the main roads of Barking like Kind Edwards, Howard and Morley roads.

In the heart of Barking is the prestigious Barking Park, renowned for its beauty and impeccable scenery. Barking Park was first opened in 1898 as an integral part of the development of Barking. The park offered an ornamental garden area, a lake, an amenity grass area fronting Longbridge Road, containing a bandstand, a small central nursery, a bowling green and tennis courts. Facilities were expanded in the 1930s to include even more leisure activities and exciting features. By the 1950s, Barking Park was known as the best community park in London, with its prominent pool in constant use.

Barking today may not hold the most prestigious reputation, but in its core, it's still a beautiful place with an even more beautiful origin.

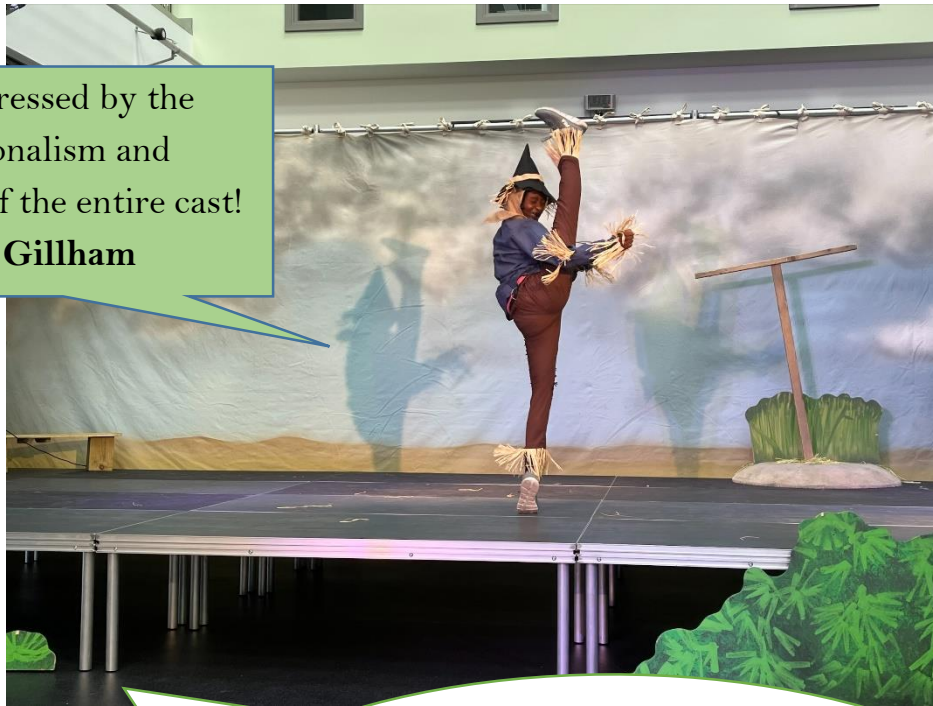

Barking has remarkably adapted into a modern, accessible, and homely town making it perfect for the citizens which reside there. Barking is equipped with leisure centre's which provide a plethora of activities, a variety of green spaces enabling people to indulge in the picturesque scenery and a vast shopping district which offers a range of unique and culturally diverse shopping experiences. Barking is a town dedicated to its people and has transformed over the years to suit the people who call Barking their home.

Barking and the Nobles

Although Barking is renowned for its up-to-date qualities, the town is rich with valuable history; significant to the reformation of the borough. Although it may not seem like it now, Barking was an immensely popular town amongst nobility for instance, the once famously known fishing district became home to William the Conqueror who surrounded himself with the luxuries Barking Abbey had to offer. 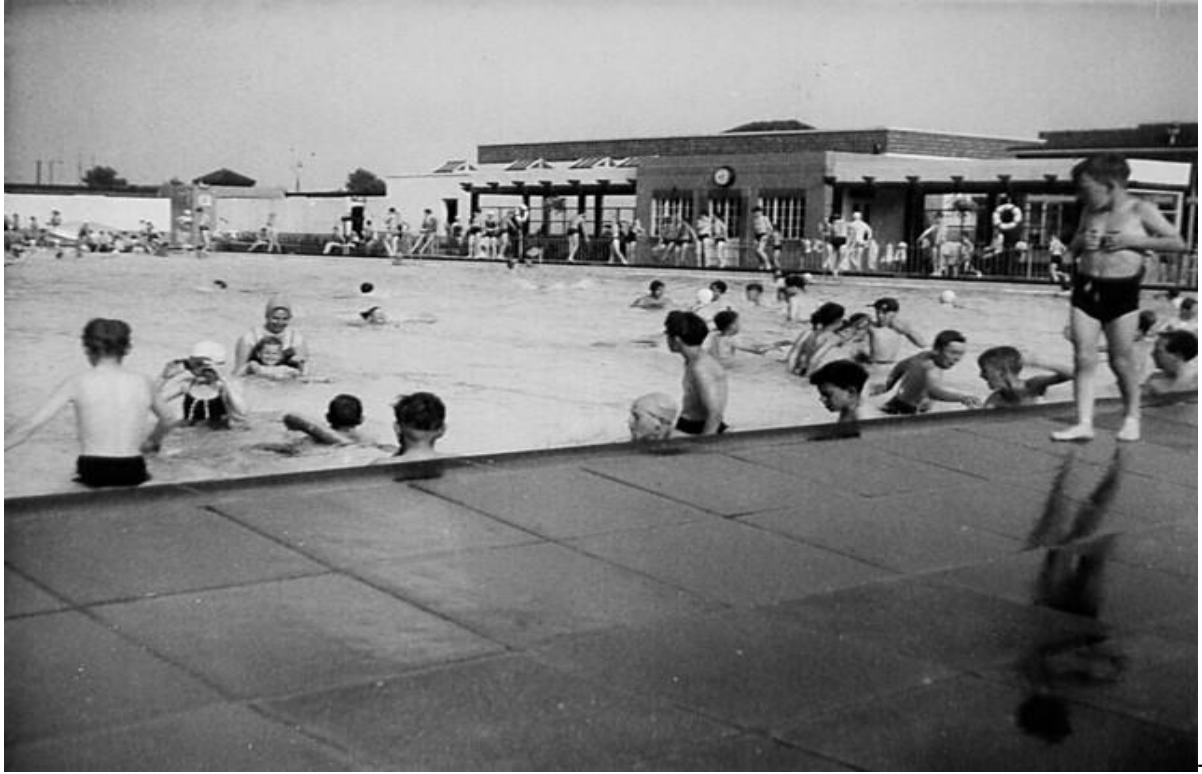


Barking also inhabits Eastbury Manor House, Valence House and the Church of St Peter and St Paul which pile onto the towns rich history as well as making them landmarks notable to visit.

Barking Park

Another point, in Barking, which surprisingly holds a substantial amount of history and has played an incredibly important part of Barking's modernization is the town's very own Barking Park. During the 20th century the green space was booming with popularity, even being named 'the best park in East London'.

When the parks facilities expanded in 1930, the park obtained a brand new, wide-spread outdoor pool, perfect for relaxing in the sun whilst enjoying the company of a joyous atmosphere. A children's play area was also an amazing addition to the park allowing parents to safely let their kids run around and relish the parks entertaining facilities. Numerous tennis courts permitted citizens to get warped into the exhilarating environment the sporting world offered as well as encouraging residents to exercise and keep fit. Finally, along with the 1930 expansion, the park was also equipped with pavilions and laboratories which citizens could acquire ensuring citizens have a comfortable visit at the park.

Although now, the exceptional pool has been filled in due to high maintenance costs, Barking Park has still successfully adapted to modern society hence converting the old-fashioned lido pool to a contemporary ‘Splash Park’ which presents an exciting new aquatic experience for young children as well as a space for adults to soak up the sun whilst plunging into the confectionary from the exclusive park shop and café. The present-day upgrades that have taken place in Barking Park still makes it a conspicuous landmark which garners popularity from citizens of all ages.

Estates

A factor which is constantly changing with the times in Barking is the accommodation it offers to its citizens. The town council has consistently played an active role in guaranteeing its citizens a comfortable place to live. These changes date back to almost 50 years ago when the borough council endorsed a motion to build spacious apartment blocks which was an architectural design that appealed a lot of interest from people during the period. These flats have served hundreds of families a comfortable and safe

The brand-new apartment schemes have also been complimented by places of worship, an upgraded vicarage field shopping centre and the opening of the new leisure space: Everdove Park.
